SVCB's Barbara Rhodes Adaptive Technology Grant is intended to help individuals afford adaptive technology, which can be a financial hardship. Potentially, the grant might fund any of the following items:

- ◆ Polarizing sunglasses like Vuarnet, which helps everyone see better!
- ◆ Hearing aids and audiologist fees—without vision, good hearing is in!
- ◆ Mobility aids (like white canes) and training with mobility instructors. How are you going to get around without your eyes?
- ◆ Accessible mobile devices. Can you use them when you can't see or hear well?
- ◆ Adapted computers—what do you do when you can't see the screen?
- ◆ Magnifying systems to work in the world around you. Imagine reading a bulletin board with poor vision.
- ◆ Medical aids. How are you going to take medications or organize them if you can't see? And suddenly your doctor wants you to use a blood pressure monitor, but you can't see. What are you going to do?
- ◆ Bar code readers that help you shop and organize things.
